### Category 1 - March

- Julius Caesar was famously told to "beware the Ides of March"- what are the Ides of a month, in the Roman calendar?
- 3. The month of March, in the Gregorian calendar, is host, every year, to this astronomical event. What is it?
- 4. Some mathematicians celebrate the 14th of March in honour of this mathematical constant.
- The month of March is also host to a popular feast day for Saint Patrick, who, according to legend, is said to have driven all of these creatures out of Ireland.

#### Category 2 - Gardening

- Karesansui is the Japanese word for this specific type of garden, found in many temple grounds, which usually includes very few plants, and was often used as an aid in meditation.
- 7. This fastest-growing plant in the world is a staple feature in many gardens and indoor plant displays, and can grow as fast as 88cm a day.
- 8. In viticulture, soil, air quality, climate and topography all affect the taste of a grape and its subsequent wine, referred to collectively by this French term.
- 9. Vanilla is often referred to as being extracted from vanilla beans in reality, the plant is not a legume, but rather belongs to this family of popular flowering plants.
- 10. The largest airborne operation in military history occurred on the 17th of September, 1944, when a combined British and American force of paratroopers attempted to seize three important bridges in the Nazi-occupied Netherlands. What was the name of this operation?

#### Category 3 - Music

- 11. Joni Mitchell's 1973 hit talked about paving paradise to put up a parking lot what was the title of the song?
- 12. David Guetta's 2022 hit, "I'm Good", topped the Billboard Pop charts little surprise, as it takes its main melody and structure from the chart-topping hit from the year 2000, "I'm Blue", by this Italian Eurodance band.
- 13. This famous band was originally known as "The New Yardbirds", referencing their guitarist's former band, before changing their name to what they are now known as before the release of their self-titled debut album in 1969.
- 14. This musical group takes their name from the older Wade-Giles romanization of the name of a Chinese mountain range, which was home to one of the two main schools of martial arts in the country, along with its counterpart, the Shaolin Monastery.
- 15. Justin Timberlake's debut solo album, Justified, featured the single "Rock Your Body", which may not have been included on the album if it hadn't been first offered to and then rejected by this pop artist.

#### Category 4 - Colours

- 16. The city of Tyre, in modern-day Lebanon, became famous in the ancient and medieval world for producing a much sought-after dye of this colour, derived from the secretions of sea snails.
- 17. Elementary schools teach the primary colours as red, yellow, and blue, which are an additive model for creating visible colours. Printers instead use a subtractive model, which is based on using these three colours, as well as black.
- 18. A 2015 viral phenomenon prompted scientists and philosophers alike to investigate the human perception of colour after disagreements broke out over a photo of this article of clothing.
- 19. These structures within the human eye are responsible for your perception of colour a deficiency in any of the three types of them may lead to colour blindness.
- 20. This H. P. Lovecraft short story was adapted into a 2019 film starring Nicholas Cage, featuring the titular alien entity haunting the farmland of a New England family.

#### Category 5 - Rivers

- 21. This river is alternately known as both "China's Pride" and "China's Sorrow", for its invaluable role in local agriculture, and the frequent floods it causes in the region.
- 22. The classical music which you might associate with zero gravity or a walk on the moon is from a waltz by Johann Strauss II, which is actually titled in tribute to this European river.
- 23. In late July of 1942, Stalin signed Order No. 227, forbidding that Soviet troops retreat during the disastrous Battle of Stalingrad commissars took up the symbolic slogan that there was "no land beyond" this river, which made up the rear of their defensive line.
- 24. The Maha Kumbh Mela festival in January 2025 set the record for the world's largest gathering of people, with a recorded 660 million people attending to bathe in this river.
- 25. Despite being surrounded by water, this nation is the only non-city-state in Europe to lack permanent rivers.

#### **Category 6 - Medicine Through the Ages**

- 26. We get the word "hysteria" from this organ, which was thought to cause it since the time of Ancient Egypt.

#### **Category 8 - Canadian Television**

- 36. This TV comedy is known for starting the careers of Eugene Levy, John Candy, and Rick Moranis, among others, and chronicled the daily mishaps at a television studio in Melonville.

- 38. A distinctive flute melody would open each of these sixty-second public service advertisements on Canadian television channels, each focused on a different element of Canada's diverse wildlife.
- 39. Before breaking out into Hollywood stardom, Ryan Gosling starred on this Canadian comedy-drama series focusing on the lives of high school students.
- 40. This Canadian trivia show pitted teams of students representing their local high schools against one another while off the air as a regular game show, the national finals of the in-school competition is still broadcast by the CBC.

#### **Category 9 - Female Historical Figures**

- 41. This pseudohistorical widow is the titular figure of one book of the Bible's Old Testament, beheading the Assyrian general Holofernes and saving Israel from imminent invasion.
- 42. This queen of the Iceni led her tribe into battle against Rome in the first century AD while her rebellion failed, her bravery was noted by Roman chroniclers, and her name endures as a national symbol in the British Isles.
- 43. The only legitimate child of Lord Byron, this writer and mathematician is known for helping Charles Babbage create the Analytical Engine, one of the earliest forerunners of the modern computer.
- 44. This saint of the Eastern Orthodox Church is famous for her unsaintly behaviour, retaliating against the Drevlians for their murder of her husband by massacring them and torching their entire city with burning sulphur attached to carrier pigeons.
- 45. Disco group Boney M. immortalized this American outlaw into an eponymous song with the release of a single off of their second album in 1977, only changing one letter in her name.

- 54. The namesake of one of the days of the week, this Norse god presided over war, the law, and valour, and lost a hand in the act of chaining the great wolf Fenrir.
- 55. According to Japanese mythology, the Imperial family descends in an unbroken line from this sun deity, also represented in the red circle on the flag of modern Japan.

#### Category 12 - Film Adaptations

- 56. Mary Harron directed this film adaptation of a Bret Easton Ellis novel, which very nearly starred Leonardo DiCaprio due to interference from the studio Christian Bale, her first choice, ended up playing the title role in the end.
- 57. This 2022 film was based on a 1985 novel of the same name by Don DeLillo, and featured Adam Driver as a "Professor of Hitler Studies" who must reckon with his own mortality, and a musical number, after being exposed to an "Airborne Toxic Event".
- 58. Paul W. S. Anderson directed a 2020 adaptation of this popular video game series, which starred Milla Jovovich as a special forces soldier transported to a world of giant, violent wildlife she is forced to hunt, lest she be hunted.
- 59. Schindler's List was a 1993 adaptation of a historical novel which chronicled the same story under a slightly different title. What was the name of the novel it was based on?
- 60. Sergio Leone ran afoul of this famous Japanese director after the release of A Fistful of Dollars, who stated that Leone had "made a fine movie, but it was my movie".
